
2024 PRIORITY ISSUES



 Why It Matters: EPA's perpetual slowdowns make it difficult for SOCMA members to commercialize new products and to meet customer expectations.

Business Impact: SOCMA is seeking
to improve the procedures and
timelines for new chemical reviews,
and to support process changes that
promote efficacy.





Why It Matters: EPA is also completing prioritization, risk evaluation and if necessary, risk management for existing chemicals using a "whole chemical" approach, resulting in broad bans on chemical uses.

Business Impact: EPA data evaluation is not transparent and SOCMA is working to ensure EPA uses accurate and complete information when analyzing chemicals.









Strengthening U.S. Competitiveness

- Why It Matters: The lapse of programs like the Miscellaneous Tariff Bill (MTB) and Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) reduce the global competitiveness of US specialty chemical manufacturers
- Business Impact: SOCMA advocates for restoring MTB and GSP and reopening a fair and transparent exclusion process for the Section 301 tariffs.

RISK MANAGEMENT PROGRAM (RMP)

• Why it Matters: The proposed rule would expand compliance requirements, increasing costs and staff time, with difficult to complete audit and the risk of significant security breaches with information disclosure requirements.

• Business Impact: SOCMA's goal is to ensure that the RMP rule does not create subjective standards, misuse resources that can be applied to process safety improvements or create facility security risks.





Chemical Facility Anti-Terrorism Standard (CFATS)

Why It Matters: With the lapse of CFATS, companies who
manufacture high-risk chemicals have lost a regulatory
structure that includes security requirements and provides
tools to companies to address a wide range of terrorist
threats.

• Business Impact: SOCMA will continue to engage lawmakers to explain the importance of this program to the security of our companies and the citizens of the United States.



- Why It Matters: This rule will mandate changes to the labelling and handling of all hazardous material, requiring SOCMA members to change labels and the labeling process, while providing better options related to small package labeling.
- Business Impact: SOCMA will continue to engage and educate OSHA and the White House on the update, supporting changes to small package labeling and educating OSHA on potential unintended consequences.
